As embodied in the hospital's motto, "it belongs to you," the new facility serves all healthcare needs of the tribe, including a primary clinic, eye clinic, dental clinic, emergency department, procedure suite, pharmacy, inpatient care and rehabilitation services. This new facility allows the Cherokee Indian Hospital Authority to transcend the legacy of the previous government-provided facility, delivering world-class healthcare services to the EBCI.

The spirit of community focus was integral to the team's mentality from the start. Robins & Morton was honored to be a part of this wonderful community, and the team regularly looked for ways to give back, participating in more than 30 individual philanthropic community events during the project's duration.

Recently there has been a popular book making the rounds called *The Martian*. It is the story of a man who, through some unfortunate events, was mistakenly left on Mars. The entire book is about his survival on Mars and the innovative ideas he develops, including the creation of oxygen, power and even growing potatoes in a Martian environment. It is truly a testament to innovation as he repeatedly overcomes challenges with creative solutions. The definition of innovation is as follows: the act or process of introducing new ideas, devices or methods resulting in significant positive change. True innovation comes from the desire or need to improve, is often brought about as a solution to an observed problem and can be implemented into everything we do on a daily basis.

The construction industry seems to be going through a period of real innovation. After many years of doing things the same old way, it appears that our industry is poised to really make some strides in how we perform and deliver construction. In fact, it's hard to read an industry publication nowadays without a reference to it. The areas of safety, operations, preconstruction and QC have all gone through a development of improvement through innovative ideas. Many companies are promoting a culture of innovation in their daily thinking and technology seems to be one of the many tools to facilitate this type of thinking. Much of this innovation seems to be the product of an energized new generation working with the guidance and input from more experience-minded people, a great mix to produce some progressive changes. To promote innovation we must empower each other to do so, encourage this type of thinking on a daily basis and reward successes.

At Robins & Morton, we have developed innovative ideas throughout our history and are promoting more of this thinking through our

Lean and Building Forward efforts. In the '70s and '80s, we started some innovative thinking by establishing set policies and procedures for everything we did. Many were simple ideas such as how to check and install dampers, paint metal studs for proper in-wall placement, and "turning the building around" to provide a single entry during construction, controlling access for cleanliness and logistical orderliness. Believe it or not, we were one of the first construction companies to use video conferencing between jobsites and the main office, saving travel time and greatly improving communication. We adopted a "three point" message for making a sales presentation, an extremely effective communication method with potential clients in a sales environment. As of late, our Building Forward program is promoting innovative thinking in many areas. Simple ideas from promoting methods for keeping people off the top step of a ladder to developing a collaborative specification review are being developed on a daily basis. More globally, we are finding ways to train and improve through cluster groups and cross-functional learning, as well as promoting the idea of inspiring for performance versus manipulating for performance. Other examples of areas of innovation include improvement in delivery of materials, subcontractor quality training and development of pricing confidence scales. Some of our projects are even developing innovation logs to track and manage the many suggestions. Robins & Morton has always had a controlled methodology for fostering and promoting innovation, and we are taking that to a new level.

Innovation and improvement can come from any level of management in the company including craftworkers, administration, executives or mid-level managers. A few characteristics of innovation leaders are:

- They have technical knowledge and expertise in their area of work
- They serve and don't direct
- They are thoughtful yet tactful and practical
- They connect with their constituent workers
- They communicate well in a wide range of circumstances
- They have breadth, versatility, and open-mindedness
- They demonstrate a desire to improve and change how we work

But most importantly, they're not afraid to accept failure, as this is a part of the innovation process. Not every idea proves to be beneficial but even those that fail often lead us to solutions.

There are many of us in the company that display these characteristics and can contribute fruitfully to the process of innovating how we do things.

The desire to improve, create innovative thinking and communicate ideas in the company is critical to our long-term success and competitiveness in the market. We are all innovators in our particular area of expertise, as well as beyond that "comfort" area, and everyone can contribute - we need only to have the willingness and habits to make this part of our daily routine. Please know that innovation and improvement by everyone is encouraged and appreciated without judgement of ideas that may fail. FLORIDA HOSPITAL TAMPA WINS NATIONAL ABC AWARD

TAMPA, FLORIDA

Associated Builders and Contractors (ABC) announced Robins & Morton as a 2015 National Excellence in Construction Pyramid award winner for the work on Florida Hospital Tampa's emergency department at the 26th Annual Excellence in Construction Gala on March 2 in Fort Lauderdale, Florida.

ABC's Excellence in Construction Awards program recognizes outstanding construction projects across the country based on safety, quality, teamwork, planning and innovation.

The project earned recognition for its complex nature, expert value engineering and continuous scheduling adjustments to ensure the project was completed on time. Part of the project's complexity was the need to build a new, modern 42,500-square-foot emergency department in the middle of the existing 475-bed hospital campus surrounded by the Women's Heart Pavilion, Pepin Heart Institute and the hospital's north tower, then connecting it to the existing facilities. This impacted every hospital utility with minimal disruptions to hospital operations.

Mid-project, Robins & Morton also kicked off the construction of a three-story, 50,000-square-foot intensive care unit (ICU) tower above the emergency department while adding an ambulance canopy, expanding the central energy plant, relocating a loading dock and tying the buildings together. Ultimately, the \$54.6 million project was completed on time and saved the owner \$2.4 million.

"This award is a commitment to our customer service and is a byproduct of exceeding our clients' expectations on every project, every time," Florida Division Manager Bruce Adams said.



ROBINS & MORTON AWARDED DUKE MEDICAL CENTER PATIENT TOWER ADDITION

DURHAM, NORTH CAROLINA

Duke University recently selected Robins & Morton for both preconstruction and construction services for the \$120 million Duke Raleigh Hospital Surgery Expansion and new bed tower. The 204,000-square-foot patient tower, located in the center of campus, will include additional surgical suites and will tie in to the existing facility. The sitework for this patient tower will consist of relocating existing utilities (main natural gas feed, medical gas tank farm, and two emergency generators) while maintaining continuous operations on campus.

Robins & Morton will work with HOK and Duke Medicine in a collaborative design-assist approach. Preconstruction services will begin in February 2016 and a construction schedule of 24 months beginning in fall 2016.

Although there were nearly 200 workers nearby, Jones said that he liked how this photograph seems to capture the "one moment where it looks like pure silence."



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
