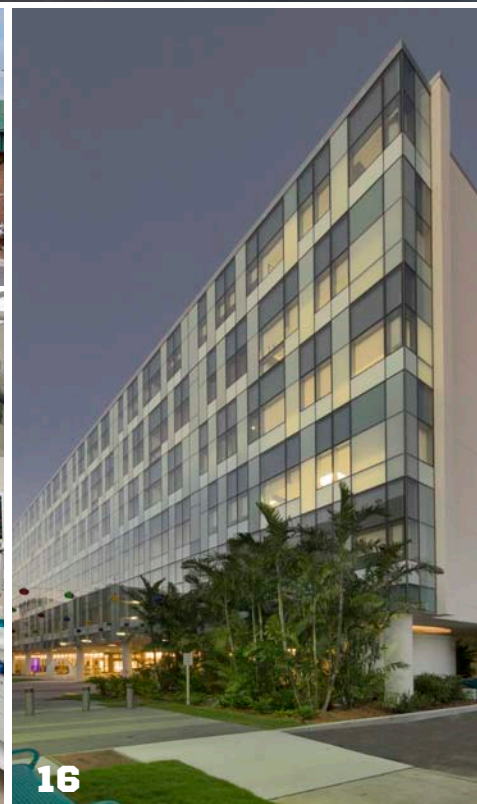
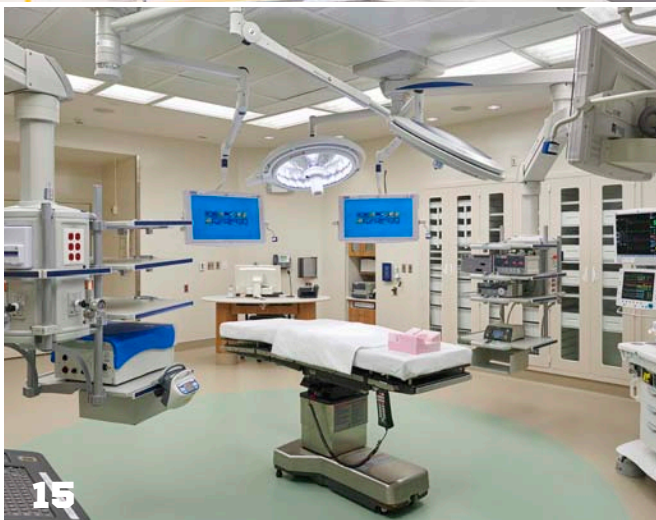
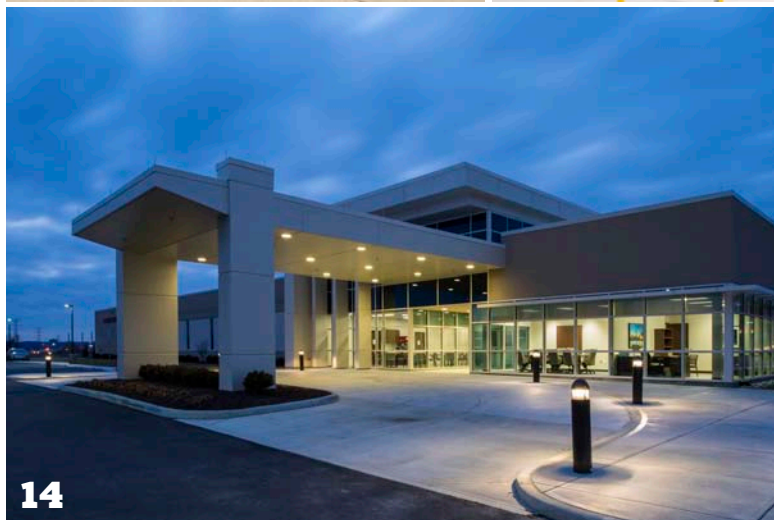

With 2016 results almost in the books, it looks like we are going to have a solid sales and revenue year. We are projecting \$1.2 billion in sales and \$1.1 billion in revenue. We will start 2017 with a \$1.4 billion backlog, an increase of five percent over last year and our highest ever.

Our 2017 business planning session is scheduled for Dec. 9, and we are optimistic about the opportunity for another excellent year of growth. As always, the construction business is truly dynamic and ever changing; we are fortunate that our major market is absolutely essential and the population demographics are favorable.

As you can see, we are now projecting to achieve 75 percent of our annual profit goal. While we did not reach our goal, this is a significant increase over last year's performance.

In review of 2016, we recognize a few of our major milestones:

- We achieved a customer satisfaction rating of 95 percent, and two of the projects that were surveyed achieved 100 percent.
- We received eleven first place ABC Excellence in Construction Awards. See the award section for a complete list.
- In March, we made a contribution to our profit-sharing plan for the 28th year in a row.
- We recognized 10 new champions of the Building Forward initiative and now 45 percent of the company has attended onboarding sessions.

- The Miami Office completed its first year of successful operation.
- We had 1,404 attendees in the Training for Excellence program, spanning 62 classes.

As we put 2016 in the record books, I want to personally thank each of you for the hard work and contribution you make to ensure our success. Our industry demands a great deal of all of us in terms of working hard and overcoming challenges. You always do whatever it takes to meet those challenges, and by doing so deliver a unique product to each client, satisfying their expectations and creating the opportunity for future work.

By demonstrating the four tenants of the Building Forward initiative and enhancing the success of the project, the team earned the Center of Excellence designation.

On Sept. 28, the project hosted two celebrations: the topping out ceremony at 11 a.m. and the Center of Excellence ceremony at 1 p.m., split by a beam sign-

ing and lunch. In addition to Wofford College faculty and staff, team members from Robins & Morton, Wofford College, McMillan Pazdan Smith Architecture, Kirlin Carolinas, Lithko Contracting, CM Steel Inc., Carolinas Structural Welding, Sears Contract, Graham-Hodge Associates, Borgosz Masonry Enterprises, and Hayes & Lunsford Electrical Contractors were recognized for their contributions to the forward momentum of this project following the facility's topping out ceremony. The 125,000-square-foot stadium will have a seating capacity for 4,500 and will house home and visitor locker rooms, a training room, coaches' office team meeting rooms. It is slated for completion in fall 2017.

DETAR HOSPITAL NAVARRO HOLDS RIBBON CUTTING FOR EMERGENCY DEPARTMENT

VICTORIA, TEXAS
