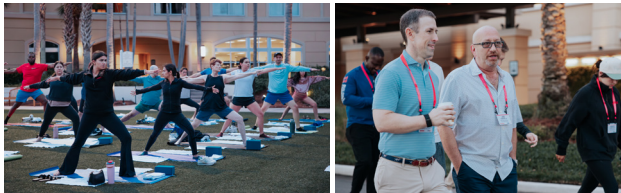

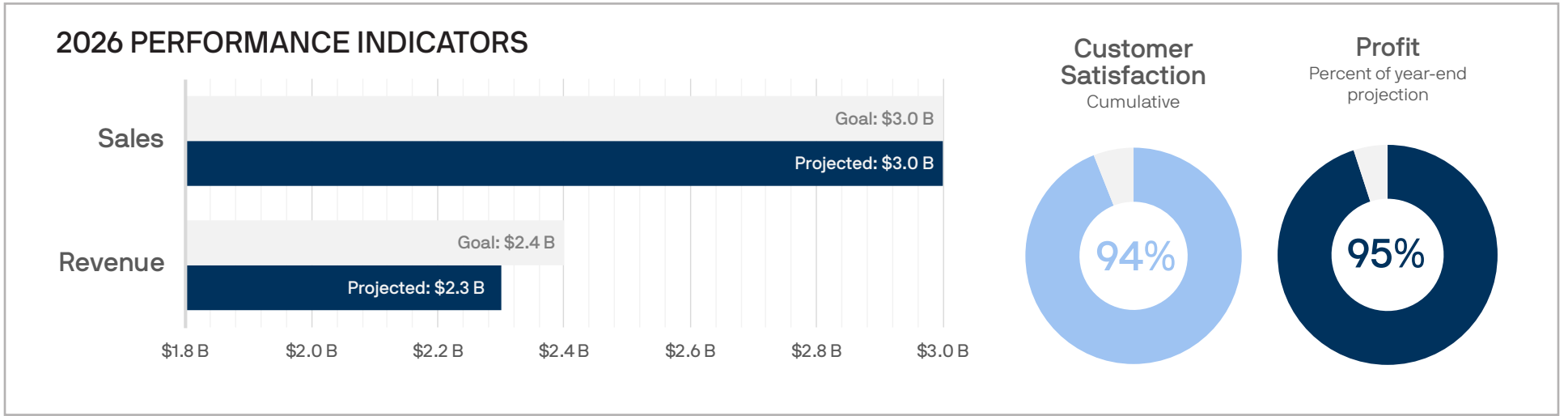

goal of \$2.4 billion. If we meet both goals, we will enter 2027 with the highest backlog in our history — \$3.8 billion.

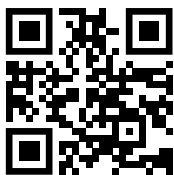

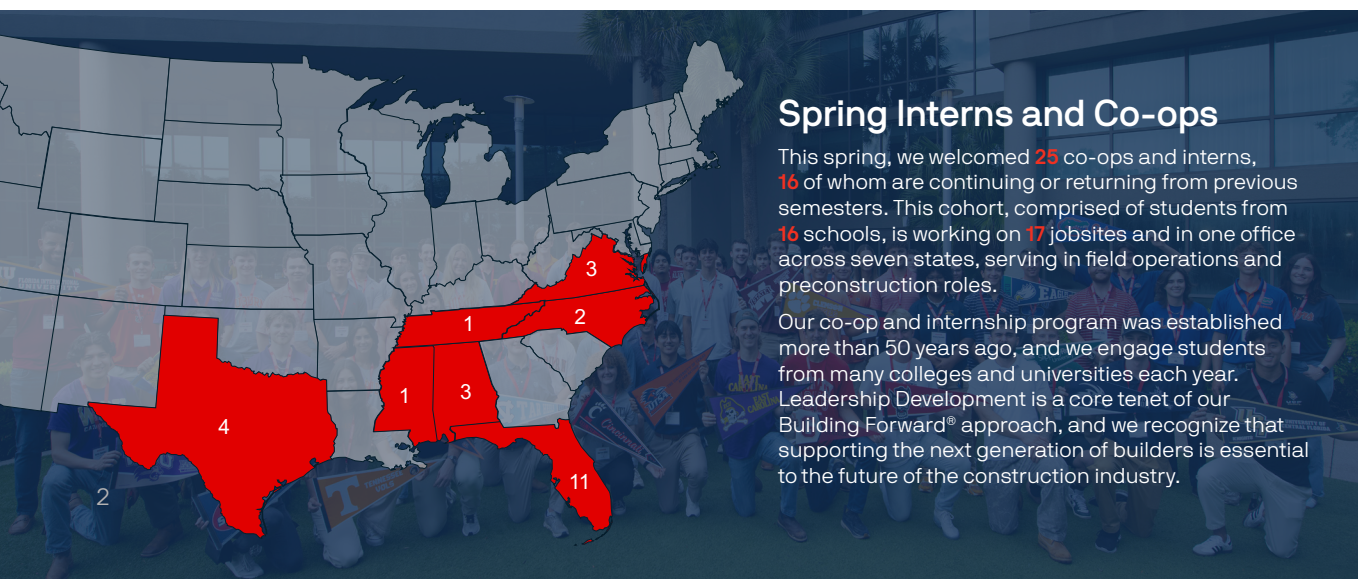
To help us meet that goal, our project teams are encouraged to implement our Jobsite Waste Management Policy OS-280, which requires reporting waste diversion metrics using our **Waste Reporting Tool**. The reports populate in our **Waste Dashboard**, where team members can track progress.

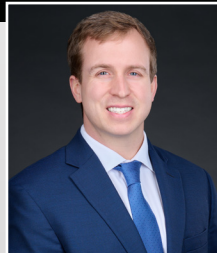
# 2025 Innovators of the Year

Meet Dusty, the friendly-faced layout expert who stands just inches tall. This robot prints digital model data directly on the jobsite floor, quickly providing a multi-trade layout "map" while maintaining accuracy to 1/16 inch.

This winter, the team at our Huntsville Hospital Madison Street Tower project — a \$150 million, five-story vertical expansion project that adds 120 patient rooms to the hospital — had the opportunity to give Dusty a test run, and the results were remarkable.

## From the President and COO Robin Savage



As we all know, Robins & Morton is celebrating its 80th year in the construction business, a significant and rare feat accomplished by only a small percentage of companies. Though much has occurred during these 80 years to progress and propel the company, the foundation of success was laid by our founder, Todd Robins, in 1946.

I recently began to think about Todd and what it must've been like to start a construction business in 1946. The company's first project was a filling station, and who can say whether it was profitable or not, but it was a start. That was followed by libraries, schools, steel mills, and an array of other commercial projects, most of which were hard-bid in a time where you laid your net worth on the line with every project.

He managed the company through three wars and countless economic cycles over 40+ years. He was a true builder and salesman, and he wore every hat necessary to build the company. Mr. Robins was also a classic Southern gentleman who chose to do things the right way and with good processes, even if it meant taking a loss on a project. He was a personally giving individual who placed great emphasis on treating people right. He had a certain charm that made you immediately like him, and I never once saw him lose his temper.

Over those 40+ years, Mr. Robins built a stellar reputation and was well respected within the community. His last major hands-on project was the Birmingham racecourse, a high-profile, complex project. Throughout that era, his work grew from an 800-square-foot filling station to a major horse track as he built the company. Perhaps most importantly, Mr. Robins established the structure of our culture that has made us successful to this day. Even though most of us never met him, at the 80-year mark we should take a moment to recognize him as our founder and cultural catalyst for what we are today.

A few words about our recent Connect event: This is our third time to get together, and by all accounts it was the best on record. Throughout the entire gathering, there was a feeling of positivity and connection among all of us. I wanted to share just a few parting thoughts and highlights.

- There were strong statements from Bill Morton about our future, longevity, and a solid succession plan to assure opportunity for all of us.
- We discussed exciting plans for growth, including expansion and innovation, as well as training and development to support this.

- We received a very entertaining and heartfelt message from our guest speaker, Bruce Pearl, about being great wherever you are and in whatever you're doing.
- There were great learning and interaction opportunities from 32 different breakout sessions, covering how we do things our way.
- We held an '80s party for the ages that touched our theme of 80 years of success — not to mention it provided an opportunity to get a little crazy on costumes!

- Our management leadership team provided open communication during our Town Hall event to answer important questions that were on all our minds.

Over our long history, there have been many factors that have made us the successful company we are today. Most importantly, it is our people who have brought us to that level of success. All of you.

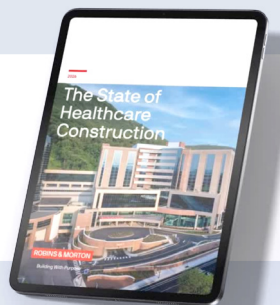

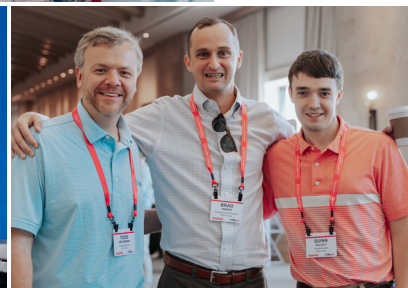

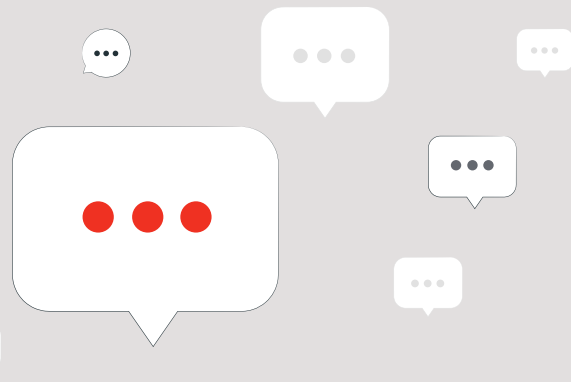

### WOMEN TALK CONSTRUCTION: CONSTRUCTION INCLUSION WEEK



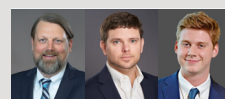

### Tim and Jayne Donahue Patient Care Tower at Jupiter Medical Center Opens

Jupiter, Florida

In January, we joined Jupiter Medical Center to celebrate the ribbon cutting of the new \$135 million Tim and Jayne Donahue Patient Care Tower in Jupiter, Florida. The five-story, 133,000-square-foot building adds 92 patient beds to the hospital's existing 248-bed capacity, and includes oncology, cardiovascular, and orthopedic services. The project included a \$20 million five-deck parking garage with 845 spaces designed to meet the needs of the growing campus. Robins & Morton served as the general contractor and ESa was the architect. This is the second project Robins & Morton has completed on Jupiter Medical Center's campus in the last five years.



### Samford University Freshman and Greek Housing Residence Halls Open

Homewood, Alabama

### Southeast Health Medical Center Breaks Ground

The four-phase project includes adding 22,693 square feet to the emergency department and renovating 23,990 existing square feet, increasing treatment spaces to accommodate up to 75,000 visits annually; adding a CT scanner to improve patient flow and efficiency; incorporating a safe treatment area for behavioral health patients; and reimagining waiting and seating areas to promote comfort, natural daylight, and a positive experience for patients. ### HCA Florida Mercy Hospital Projects Complete

Miami, Florida



Our expansion and renovation projects at HCA Florida Mercy Hospital in Miami are now complete. The \$2.5 million inpatient rehab project, completed in October, included a 15,898-square-foot renovation of the third floor. 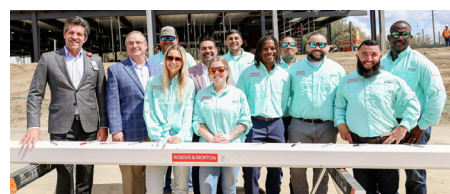

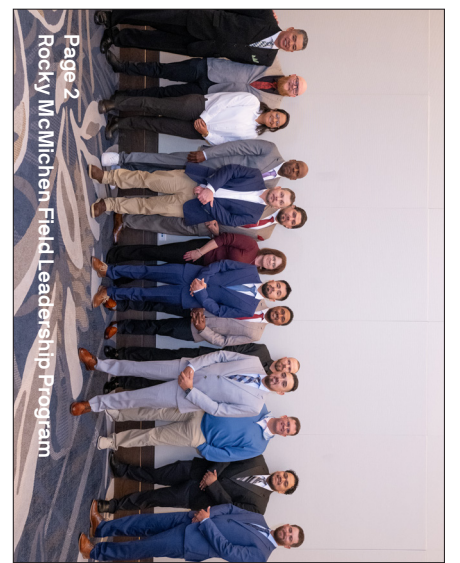
